## MINI LESSON

### Your family

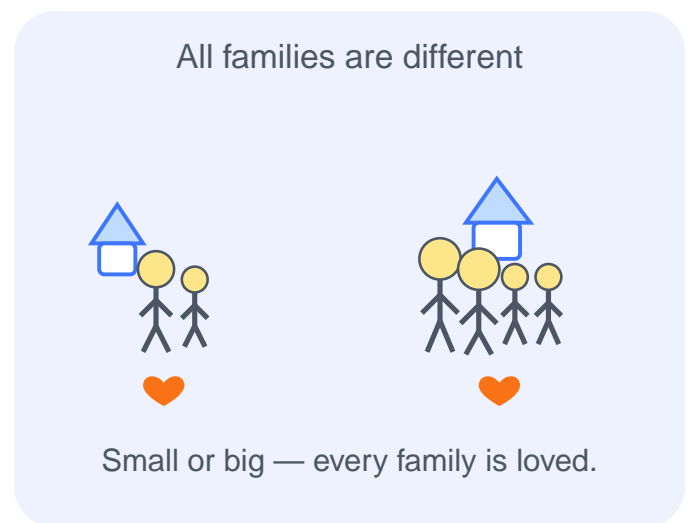
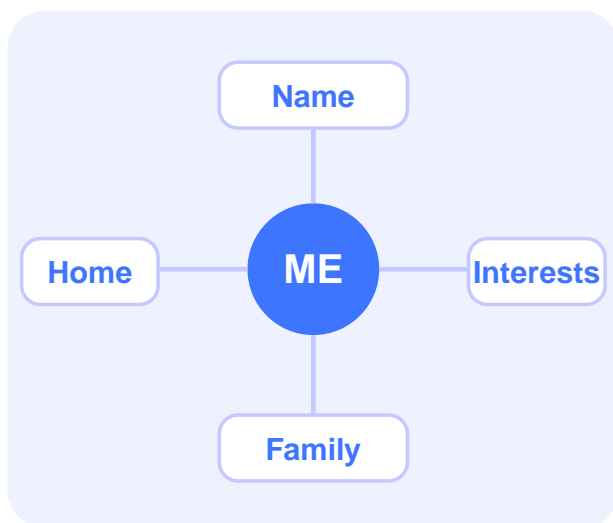
- Your family is the group of people who love and care for you at home.

- No two people have exactly the same combination of name, family, home, and interests.
